GENERAL INFORMATION

1. NT Elective Module Updates

This year the school organised two NT Elective Modules for our Secondary 2NT, 3NT and 4NT students, namely *Dramatique* and *Fun with Animation* at ITE College Central from 26 March to 29 March.



Dramatique module enabled students to apply basic acting skills as well as assist in managing and executing various production activities leading up to a performance. This module was a taster-course to the actual Higher Nitec Performance Production course and complemented the stage management lessons they had in Cabin Club. The students certainly enjoyed themselves producing a short play at ITE Central's Black Box as part of their assessment criterion.

Fun with Animation, a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) module provided students with fundamental skills in character creation and digital animation. Students were engaged as they created animation clips as part of the assessment criterion.

We hope that the students would do well in the respective modules to attain the ITE Certificate of Achievement, earning themselves a credit unit point to be used when they enrol themselves in ITE elective module courses in the future when these certificates are issued end of the year.

2. Appreciation of Chinese Musical

On 5 April, 141 students, mainly from the secondary three cohort, went to Gateway Theatre to watch a Mandarin adaptation of the classic fairy tale “Alice in Wonderland” (艾丽斯梦游仙境). Set in the Singapore context, the musical centred on a girl named Alice who had an overwhelming passion for dance. However, in pursuing her dreams, she faced strong objection from her aunt. In despair, she entered a magical forest and met a huge talking cat that looked like her pet cat, twin brothers who resembled her pair of dancing shoes, a mad hatter who looked like her brother and the red and white queen who resembled her overbearing aunt. As she journeyed through the mysterious and magical world, she learned to overcome her fear and fought bravely to realise her dreams.

As the World Youth Dance Competition Finals drew near, she continued to practise hard and stayed focused despite her ankle injury. Drawing close reference to the experiences of students in reality, the heart-warming story was told through a flawless tapestry of song, dance and wonderful theatrical lighting effects. Our girls were a great audience. We are grateful to the Committee to Promote Chinese Language Learning - Cultural Programme Exposure Scheme (CPCLL-CPES) and Tote Board (Arts Grant) for making this cultural appreciation experience possible for our students.

3. KC Sports Evening

This key sports event in the school calendar was held on 6 April at the SUTD Sports Field. One refreshing change to this year's Sports Meet was that it was held in the late afternoon/ evening instead of the morning to create another memorable KC experience for our students. The PE Department also field tested the House system for greater all-round spirited participation. The response was phenomenal. Students cheered enthusiastically for their Houses and the spectator stand was awashed with respective House colours and banners / signs.

The naming of the Houses also brought an opportunity to allow the students to relate more intimately with our heritage. Befittingly, names of our pioneers of IJ education and ex-principals of Katong Convent were considered:

- Father Barre – Founder of the Infant Jesus Order
- Mother Mathilde Raclot – Founder of Infant Jesus schools in Singapore
- Sister St Theodora – Principal @ KC, 1930 - 1937
- Sister Veronica – Principal @ KC, 1955 - 1958
- Sister Finbarr – Principal @ KC, 1959 - 1971
- Sister Josephine - key person who promoted speech and drama in KC

 For this year of field-testing, the four Houses were named Deirdre (Yellow House), Barre (Blue House), Finbarr (Green House) and Mathilde (Red House).

The event began with the sports CCA leaders relay, where our 6 CCA leaders carried the school flag around the track, passing it on to Ms Chan, our Principal, who then declared the official start of Sports Evening. Excitement mounted as we prepared to start the 100m race for the secondary one students. Representing their new classes and Houses for the first time, spectators cheered for their respective Houses hoarsely and could not wait for the race to begin. After that, the next few races came fast and furious, with the 4 x 100m race followed quickly by the 8 X 50m relay.

The inter-class 8 X 50m race gave the students the flexibility to determine the actual distance each of the 8 runners in each team would run. This was then followed by the long rope jump with ten girls from each class jumping their way to the countdown for three minutes, all to the accompaniment of uplifting music. The Houses were led by their respective House Captains and came up with enthusiastic, catchy and spirited cheers.

The parents also got into the action when they participated in the Teachers/Parents/Alumni 8 X 50m relay and a novelty game, KC footy. Teachers from the Languages, Humanities and Science departments raced against a parents' team as well as a team comprising of KC alumni. The parents, teachers and alumni were not the only ones who had a good time during the race, as the students also clearly enjoyed watching and cheering them on. KC footy was also a new event, with parents and daughters teaming up against the teachers in a territorial game. A contact sport played between two teams of fifteen players (ten outfield and five rolling substitutes) on a football field, players tried to score by kicking or throwing the ball into the opposing goal post where there were no goalkeepers. All players displayed tremendous teamwork and commitment to outdo the opponents.

The event ended at about 7.15 pm and everyone was in high spirits with the floodlights blazing on the stadium. Students rushed to the field to take photographs to capture their Kodak moments to remember what had been a most eventful Sports Evening.

The PE department would like to thank the PTSG for their much appreciated help in the running of the various races, and of course, for their participation in the Teachers-Parents relay and the novelty game.

4. Brownie Revel

On 7 April, Katong Convent Girl Guides successfully hosted the 11th East Division Brownie Revel for Brownies in the East Division schools, together with Guides from 6 other secondary schools - Bedok View Secondary School, Cedar Girls' Secondary School, Chung Cheng High (Main), Geylang Methodist Secondary School, Pasir Ris Crest Secondary and Tampines Secondary School. The theme for this year's Brownie Revel was "All Onboard!", a call for everyone to do our part in conserving our environment, in line with this year's World Thinking Day theme "Impact".

The Guides conducted skills workshops for the Brownies, such as using biodegradable substances to remove stains on clothing and using recycled materials to make useful craft items. After a fruitful time of learning, the Brownies took part in competitions like snack making, headgear making, performance and tele-match, showcasing the skills they honed during their activity sessions in school.

It was a rewarding experience for Katong Convent Girl Guides, as we learnt event organising skills and made friends with Guides from other schools. We hope that the Brownies found the event meaningful and enjoyable.

5. 2019 Secondary Three Subject Options Briefing

In Katong Convent, the process of secondary two students choosing their subject combination for Upper Secondary is one step in the larger Education and Career Guidance journey during their secondary school years. During the concurrent briefings for the Express and Normal (Academic) cohorts on 11 April, parents and students were introduced to the various post-secondary education pathways, the type of learners they cater to and the role of the different subjects in the admission criteria.

Framed within this context, parents and students should take a long term view when choosing the subjects, as well as consider their alignment with the student's strengths, interests and ability. Parents were also encouraged to continue this conversation with their daughters. Helpful strategies are available in the booklet 'Journeying with our Children from Education to Aspirations', which was issued to students in the week after the briefing. Parents of secondary two students may access the slides presented on MC online.

6. Singapore Schools Debating Championship

KC Debate continued 2018's debating season with the annual Singapore Schools Debating Championship that ran from 9 February to 20 April. This highly competitive national competition was held over three qualifying rounds that pitted schools of equivalent division status against each other to decide entrants through to the quarters, semi and final rounds.



Competing in Division 2, Katong Convent fielded debaters Lauryn Foo En Qi (Sec 3/5), Charlotte Lee Jia Wei (Sec 3/5), Cheryl Chua Xin Miao (Sec 3/6), Lydia Lee Yun Qi (Sec 4/3) and Christine Ong Shu Hui (Sec 4/5) who had been competing together as a team since secondary one.

The qualifying rounds were held on 9 February, 2 and 23 March. Over these three separate evenings at various school venues, KC battled with St. Anthony's Canossian Secondary School, Paris Ris Crest Secondary School and St. Margaret's Secondary School. KC subsequently met Anglican High School at the quarter-finals stage.

Even though we did not proceed further this year, we are happy to report that Christine Ong Shu Hui (Sec 4/5) had been awarded a commendable Best Speaker Award. She was ranked top 12 among 20 competitors. Congratulations to Christine and well done to the KC debate team that did us proud.

7. Fundraising Muffin Sale

In the spirit of nurturing entrepreneurial skills and encouraging the girls to sharpen their baking skills, Katong Convent's Nutrition and Food Science Department sustained its annual muffin sale conducted by some secondary two students on 23, 26 and 27 April.

The students were tasked to do an online research on muffin recipes based on the allocated budget and target audience. This task was an extension of their secondary two coursework where they carried out an investigation on the types of flour and its impact on the flavour and texture of the baked items.

As part of the process, students also learnt to create sale proposals, design advertisements and market their muffins to the school. With the support of the school population, a total of \$1,272 was raised from the sales. The proceeds were channelled to support needy students of our school.

8. ITE Experience Programme for Sec 3NA students

As part of the ITE Experience Programme, the 3NA students visited the ITE College East on 27 April. From Hospitality Operations to Culinary Arts, Web Applications, Logistics Services and Biotechnology, we were introduced to the wide range of courses offered by the Institute of Technical Education (ITE). In particular, the students learnt more about the Direct-Entry-Scheme to Polytechnic Programme (DPP), where N-Level students take up a 2-year Higher Nitec course with a guaranteed place in the polytechnic if minimum entry requirements are met. Prior to this scheme, N-Level students only had the option of taking up Nitec courses usually completed before Higher Nitec.

During the campus tour, they gained an insight into the industry-standard facilities available at ITE College East, such as fully equipped hospital wards for training Nursing students and high-tech machinery for engineering students. The students were also treated to a light and sound performance put together by students from Electrical Technology (Lighting & Sound). The students also heard first hand from current ITE students on the courses. A present student of Electrical Technology waxed lyrical about it being the perfect course for him being a music lover as he gets to watch performances by various bands as part of their studies.

Students were then assigned to two different hands-on stations based on a RIASEC test they completed earlier in the day. Developed by American psychologist John Holland, the RAISEC test matches personalities with various occupation types. Each station represented one of the schools



in ITE College East – School of Applied & Health Sciences, School of Business & Services, School of Electronics & Info-Comm Technology and School of Engineering. Students learnt the basics of a variety of skills such as using coding to programme a robot to complete a 10m course on its own, creating a simple mobile phone app, making popcorn and the fundamentals of accounting. There was a great sense of satisfaction in the air as students successfully completed the various tasks.

After the full day of activity, our students left with a broader understanding of the rich learning opportunities and viable pathways that ITE has to offer. Undoubtedly, the rich learning will silent any misinformed on ITE’s competitive edge in the post-secondary landscape of applied skills.

9. Environment Matters

Singapore has designated 2018 as our Year of Climate Action. Hence, during the YED (Youth for the Environment Day) month of April, KC conducted several activities to promote climate action and fight climate change. This included participation in the National Environment Agency (NEA) Climate Action Challenge and an intra-school online Climate Action Challenge for all students. The deadline for the quiz has been extended to 18 May in view of the mid-year examination. In addition, two National Education (NE) representatives did a presentation on Plastic Waste and its effect on our environment during the NE sharing on 24 April. The video presentation which left an impact on the school population has galvanised the school to influence consumer habits. For a start, the use of plastic (i.e. straws) and Styrofoam will be progressively cut down through our canteen vendors.

Students are encouraged to think about how they can contribute towards a sustainable environment, and commit to carrying out individual and collective actions to promote climate action in their daily lives. 10. Assembly Programme (Semester 1)

The 2018 Semester 1 Assembly Programme was oriented towards relationship building as a class, a school and a family. The highlights that helped the Student Development Team fulfil this objective included a mind-opening reflection by 98.7FM on the harms of cyberbullying, a heartfelt presentation by FamChamps on family relations, a moving film screening of 'Bunga Sayang' by Royston Tan, a forum theatre performance on peer relations and issues by KC's very own Dramatic Arts Society and a fun-filled art activity, 'Zentangled Class Signage' by the Art Department to foster class spirit.

Two sessions were also dedicated to encourage students to explore their spirituality by focussing on meaning-making in their life experiences to help them discover ways to be the best for themselves and others. Students had time to reflect on their lives and actions and examined deeply how to live out the school values, such as integrity and perseverance.

KC was also fortunate to have Dr Wee Hong-Ling, a New York-based Singaporean artist for an assembly session. Back in town to feature her work *No Place Like Home*, Dr Wee recalled how she felt when she first touched clay. “It created a feeling in me that was so new, so refreshing. I felt so excited, so inspired.” We are indeed grateful to our scientist-turned-artist guest who shared with the students her delightful professional world, from being a NASA scientist to a practising artist.

Semester 2 assembly programme will continue to nurture our students in holistic ways.



ACHIEVEMENTS

1. Anglo Chinese Junior College History Competition 2018

On 21 April, 2 teams from our secondary four Elective and Full History students participated in the Anglo Chinese Junior College History Competition 2018 organised by the ACJC History Society, in collaboration with the West Zone Centre of Excellence for Language Arts. This competition challenged participants with topics and questions of international and historical significance.

One of our teams managed to advance to the semi-finals and clinched 4th position in the competition. The team comprised Goh Sze Ying (Sec 4/4), Eelyn Yap Teng Ying (Sec 4/6) and Christabelle Andrea Teo Qi Yun (Sec 4/6). Despite the intense competition, the students rose to the challenge and put in their best effort. Well done, girls!

2. National Inter School Canoeing Championships 2018

The National Inter School Canoeing Championships 2018 was held from 2 to 5 April at the MacRitchie Reservoir. In this competition, Team KC fielded a team of twenty-one canoeists to compete in the B-Division and C-Division Girls in various categories.

A special mention to Hailey Eryn Anwari (Sec 2/2) for her achievement in getting the 5th position in the C-Division JK1 500m, and we also congratulate Hailey, Layla Grace O'Connor (Sec 2/3), Anusha Nanak Parashar (Sec 2/5) and Shannon Lee (Sec 2/5) for their achievement in getting the 5th position in the C-Division K4 500m despite the stiff competition from other schools.

Team KC acknowledges the hard work put in by the competitors. The experience fostered camaraderie within the team - it had not only made them teammates but friends as well. 4. National School Games Taekwondo Championships 2018

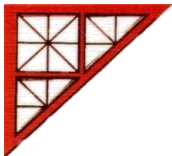
From 16 to 19 April, four of our students participated in the National School Games Taekwondo Championships 2018, and we are proud to announce that two of them clinched prizes in the following categories:
